Borneo City Forum

n conjunction with the 21st anniversary of City Day, Kota Singkawang celebrated with 10-day festival festival which included leisure events, musical performances, an expo and sports tournaments. One of the key events was the 1st Borneo City Forum (BCF) held on 15th October 2022 at Swiss-Bellinn Hotel, Singkawang. The theme for the forum "One Vision One Borneo" was in-line with the rapid development of cities in Borneo Island after the announcement of the new capital city in Kalimantan.

BCF was jointly organized by Ikatan Arsitek Indonesia Kalimantan Barat (IAI KalBar) and Pemerintah Kota Singkawang. Wali Kota, Tjhai Chui Mie, S.E., M.H., believes in working together with architects as city designers in uplifting the well-being of the built environment and people in Kota Singkawang. BCF was designed as a platform for discussion and networking with cities in Borneo for better understanding and potential collaboration between cities. The forum was conducted in two parts. The first part consists of presentations by renowned architects and researchers. The second part was presented by representatives from architectural institutes around the region.

PAMSC is honoured to be invited as one of the speakers for BCF. We took this opportunity to introduce our chapter to participants of BCF, sharing our initiatives and collaboration with our members, government, industry partners, and the public.

Journey to the South

his is my first trip to Kalimantan, a place that is so near to us yet so far (long hours) to travel. Due to the last minute arrangements, I decided to take the five and half hour road trip, instead of flying through multiple cities to reduce some carbon footprint. The Customs and Security point at Biawak and Aruk was very smooth. Other than the narrower road from the Aruk border onwards, the rest are quite comfortable.

Kota Singkawang is about half the size of Kuching in population, covered by mostly low-rise buildings over a gridiron city plan. It is a city with the most Chinese population in Indonesia and the Hakka dialect is widely spoken among the Chinese. Kota Singkawang is also known as the "City of Thousand Temples" where buildings with Chinese art and sculptures are easily found around the city.

Kota Singkawang is also famous for its unique local food, Hakka "Choy-pan" (菜粿) is one of the best for me. It is traditional Hopoh (河麥) Hakka's steamed vegetable dumplings. Fresh jicama or chives cooked with dried shrimp, covered in a thin layer of rice skin. The best way to eat the Choy-pan in Singkawang is to eat it together with the local "kopi".

A fruitful journey

After 4D3N in Kota Singkawang, I am amazed by the similarities between Kota Singkawang and Kuching; in dialect, food, culture and multiracial living among the people. The forum is the first physical event by IAI, and many representatives from outside of West Kalimantan travelled long hours to support the event (I travelled the least). It is also an important platform to connect cities on this island to share knowledge and collaborate with each other for the benefit of all. Hopefully, there are more connectivity among the cities to bring us closer physically or virtually.








WHAT DO ARCHITECTS DO ALL DAY? 7/12






Polish coffee cake

We received this gift of Polish coffee cake, with a note explaining its drawbacks due to the lack of a certain ingredient; butter. Some might say if you don't have enough butter then don't make cake. But I see a slightly different mindset - getting things done is better than waiting for a perfect opportunity.

Designers face this problem constantly - waiting for that perfect idea before presenting their scheme, which almost never comes before the deadline. It is better to launch the initial ideas and thoughts in their infancy and see if they take root. There are several immediate benefits:

- it takes the pressure off, and it releases you to have more (and better) ideas.
- your team members can 'see' what is on your mind, and help to review and comment.
- your client (or tutor if you are a student) knows that although this might not be the final scheme, you are making progress.
- 4. He can then review with his team and provide feedback which will shape the scheme, and make him part of the design team/process.

Mesyuarat Jawatankuasa Pembinaan Sibu

Pamsc is now a member of the Jawatankuasa Pembinaan Sibu (JPSI), a task-force initiated by the Sibu Branch of Lembaga Pembangunaan Industri Pembinaan Malaysia (CIDB). The purpose of the task-force is to bring to attention, discussion and act on issues brought forth by the major stakeholders of Sibu's construction industry. These issues pertain in particular to areas of education, training, betterment of workers' welfare, and statutory policies.

On the 27th September 2022, PAMSC attended the 3rd monthly meeting of the year, held at the Sibu CIDB Centre. The meeting was attended by representatives from all segments of Sibu's construction industry, which included Government and Semi - Government sectors like JKR, DID, Land and Survey, Customs and Sarawak Energy, as well as private sector Developers, Consultants, Contractors, Suppliers, Trainers, their respective organizations, Universities, and even Banks.

The meeting brought to light several issues pertaining to the local construction scene, and invited the attendees to elaborate, brainstorm and resolve the matters through their respective offices. At the conclusion



of the meeting, the task-force resolved to address and improve, among others, the following issues:

- A call for greater Safety related compliance, and the resolution of observed issues at local sites
- Greater exposure and awareness of local training programmes for skilled workers
- A call for wider BIM adoption, awareness and training among local stakeholders
- Coordination of utility companies to resolve drainage and utility mapping issues


37 participants attended the session, in which Ar. Adrianta discussed professional judgement, maturity of mindset, answering techniques, and healthy practices in the context of both the exam as well as in real - life practices.

The attendees interacted with Ar. Adrianta, and were able to present sample answers for critique and review. At the end of the 4-hour evening session, the attendees expressed more confidence and energy in their preparations for the upcoming examination.

As a conclusion to the event, Ar. Adrianta shared the following salient points of advice:

- (a) Strategize both time and answering methods. Think about personalized formats for the use of point forms, short forms, and which questions to answer first.
- (b) Practice as many times as possible with past exam papers, in order to establish familiarity with common questions.
- (c) Make sure you read the questions carefully. Do not misunderstand the instructions.
